They say, we are sent for by a bret of Zewant to speake  
with his Honour the Governo<sup>r</sup> gen<sup>t</sup> Pierce and  
afterwards a bret was sent to us by Col Dowsey autho-  
rized by Maryland & Virginia that we might make  
the greatest hast to come downe, which we haue done  
and say saith, that we nor none living amongst us shall  
for the future injure any of their persons or goods where-  
upon we answer & promise, that for the future we  
shall not injure or doe any damage to the people of  
Maryland or Virginia, & doe thank the gentlemen there  
that they doe exhort us to the peace, for we are so minded.
