The Onondage answer to the proposition
made to them the twentieth day of July 1677
by the Hon^{ble} Col Henry Coursey authorized
by Charles Lord Bacon of Baltimore Lord
Proprietor of Maryland, in the Court house
of Albany the one & twentieth of July 1677

The names of the Sachins are
Carachkondic - who was Speaker
Tanouianichta
Sienotharij
Onirequichtaro

They say, we are sent for by a beere of Zewant to speak
with his Honour the Governour & gen^l here And
afterwarde a beere was sent to us by Col Coursey autho-
rized by Maryland & Virginia that we might make
the greater hast to rouse downe, which we have done
And he saith, that we now none living amongst us shall
for the future injure any of their persons or goods where
upon we answer & promise, that for the future we
shall not injure or doe any damage to the people of
Maryland or Virginia, & doe thank the gentlemen there
that they doe resort us to the peace, for we are so minded,

(but
