I was moreover demanded of Mr. Said Vaughan whether or no<sup>t</sup>  
he had formerly had any familiarity or dealings of the like nature

For answer he denyeth what ever before been concerned with  
y<sup>e</sup> said Mr. Lowell for our acre of land v. fide<sup>r</sup> the 3000 Lards  
mentioned in the Letter, or to have had at any time any commu-  
nication with Mr. J<sup>r</sup> Lowell, to encourage him to this attempt,  
which he was heartily sorry for, if it had been injurious to  
him, but declareth that he had no such design in it, neither  
did he conceive it criminal when first he mentioned it in his  
Letter for that he had known it practicable amongst Deputy  
Surveyors to return into y<sup>e</sup> Office the Survey of land which they had  
not for want of another persons laying out which he could  
make appear, and produced a Letter under the hand of  
Col<sup>r</sup> Lov<sup>r</sup> to that purpose.

Which was read & forthwith command given by his Maj<sup>y</sup> to  
the Surveyor General strictly to inquire therinto & examine  
whether any Petition had been returned into the Office by  
virtue thereof or any Grants passed under those circumstances.

The said Vaughan reciveth y<sup>e</sup> present chck of his Maj<sup>y</sup> and the  
Board for his confidence in attempting to corrupt the aforesd.
