

and give leave; if they will find any of their Indian Doct^r to
 endeavour this cure, I shall be glad to give M^r George Roberts the trouble of
 bringing this to your L^{ds} hands, having been with me in the whole affair
 and came best satisfied your L^{ds} in any thing relating hereto to be done
 for a Letter. And now my Lord, I have one thing to begg on behalf of
 the East India Company at least, that your L^{ds} please to take into your Consider-
 ation (what I have moved your L^{ds} with formerly) whether it be
 not convenient to issue out Proclamations under your Majesty's
 upon all those that shall attempt to give, sell, or vend any such
 provisions whatsoever furnish any Indian or Indians with any
 Drums or other strong liquors, especially whilst they are at or amongst
 the English plantations.

His L^{ds} acquaints this Board that he had according to Lord Kings
 request Empowered him to send for the Neighbouring Indians and
 give them such satisfaction from your L^{ds} acknowledgement of the wound
 Indian as is expressed in the Letter and also had signified to him his
 L^{ds} approbation of his proceedings so far in his affair
 which is also approved by this Board.

Ordered that Proclamation issue prohibiting the selling giving
 or disposing of to any Indians whatsoever any drums or other
 strong liquors whilst they are at or about the English plantations
 and the pain of incurring his L^{ds} heavy displeasure.

Ordered also that Proclamation issue prohibiting the exportation of
 Indian Corn or Wheat and the pain of incurring his L^{ds}
 heavy displeasure

By the Lord Prop: a Proclamation

Proclamⁿ prohibiting
 drink to Indians

Whereas the giving selling or disposing of to the Indians using or
 frequenting the English plantations within this Province, Brandy Rumme
 and other strong liquors in such quantities as to render them drunk and un-
 able to labour and therefore may be of very fatal Consequence to this
 Province, the Masters or Owners of such liquors not only creating to them-
 selves thereby their own trouble and disturbance with the hazard of their
 own lives, but also endangering bringing upon the Province a chargeable
 and expensive Warre in case of any murder, insolency or mischief committed
 or done by such Indians drunk and unadvised as aforesaid; It shall be provided
 for the honor to come, and to establish as much as may be the future peace
 and tranquillity of this Province with the lives and satisfaction of the
 Indians
