not convenient to issue out Proclamation under severall penaltys,
upon all those that shall attempt to give, sell, or vend any such
pekkuchet allover furnishe any Indian or Indians with any
Drams or other strong Liquors, specially whilst they are at or amongst
the English plantations.

His Lopp acquaints this Board that he had according to told Robins —
rewards Empowered him to send for the Neighbouring Indians and
gave them such satisfaction from y^e acknowledgement of th^e wounded
Indian as is expressd in the Letter and also had signified to him his
approbation of his proceedings so far in this affaire
which is also approved by this board. —

Ordered that Proclamation issue prohibiting the selling giving
or disposing off any Indian what so ever any drams or other
strong liquors whilst they are at or about the English plantations
and the paine of incurring his Lopp heavy displeasure.

Ordered also that Proclam: issue prohibiting the exportation of
Indian corn or Wheat and on the like paine of incurring his Lopp
heavy displeasure

Proclam: prohibiting
drunk to y^e Indians

Whereas the giving selling or disposing of to the Indians using or
frequenting the English plantations within this Province, Drunks and
and othe: strong liquors in such Quantitys as to render them drunk and mad,
that aftertimes produced hereafter may be of very fatal Consequence to this
Province, the Masters or Owners of such liquors not only creating to them-
selves thereby their own trouble and disturbance with the hazard of their
own lives, but also endangering bringing upon the Province a chargeable
and expensiv: Warre in case of any murder, insolvency or mischief committed
on them by such Indians drunk and mad as aforesaid; itt touch to prevent
for the time to come, and to establish as much as may be the future peace
and tranquillity of this Province with the lives and lasttide of the
Inhabitants
