to shed Innocent blood and that thereupon we hoped a happy Peace-  
would ensue, To w. they replied that they were joyfull to be inform-  
of this good News to y<sup>e</sup> Empero<sup>r</sup> and that he would be very glad  
to receive it

Upon Consideration of y<sup>e</sup> Premises it is Ordered.

That Col<sup>l</sup>. Coursey do go with y<sup>e</sup> said Indians over to Nantuxet  
bringing in his custody the two Prisoners brought over with him, and  
thence apply himself to Col<sup>l</sup>. William Burges Command<sup>r</sup> in Chief  
and acquaint him with the said Indians, who is to make Demand of  
Krawacom and Sapomeco the said Indians whom y<sup>e</sup> Indian Prisoner  
had accus'd of y<sup>e</sup> murder: and if after all that shall be urg'd for  
their Delivery and other pregnant circumstances it shall appear  
that no such Persons are among them, and that no other Person than  
that One Indian already deliver'd up were concern'd in y<sup>e</sup> murder:  
but that it was only a fallacy or fiction of y<sup>e</sup> said Indian Prisoner  
Today time to prolong his life or find an Opportunity of Escape  
And that y<sup>e</sup> two English Children formerly taken by the Wiccomif  
are not living among them or within their knowledge, that the two  
Indians w<sup>ch</sup> came over w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup> Col<sup>l</sup>. Coursey and committed into his  
custody be immediately releas'd, and Leave them to be concluded with  
the Empero<sup>r</sup> and his Indians according to such ord<sup>r</sup>s & Instructions  
as the said Command<sup>r</sup> in Chief hath already rec'd. from y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>.  
Thomas Nolley Esq<sup>r</sup>. Governo<sup>r</sup>. Obliging the Empero<sup>r</sup> One year  
at a certain time in some convenient place to pay unto y<sup>e</sup> Hon<sup>ble</sup>.  
the Lord Proprietor or his Governo<sup>r</sup>. four Indian Arrowes as an  
Acknowledgm<sup>t</sup>. of their Subjection to him, and Receiving protection  
from him and Our Sovereign Lord Charles the Second by y<sup>e</sup> grace  
of God King of England, Scotland, France and Ireland Defender  
of y<sup>e</sup> Faith &c.
