It was also sent from the Gouverneur to Capt. Nimon Baker  
at the head of Pemigewasset River requiring him to continue his  
ranging and follow those Indians formerly sent him for the guard-  
ing thereof and care taken for finding the Croppes of them  
that were employed in that Service by the following ord:

Whereas for the better Satisfaction of those people that are  
raided for & service of the frontiers at the head of Pottuxen  
River and that they might not thereby be damaged in their Croppes  
during their absence the Gouverneur empowered Maj: Henry Foster  
(of his warrants to be issued forth to several Constables of the  
several Hundreds where those people doe resid) to take care and  
see that those within their provinces that were left behind and remained  
at home should look after and tend the Croppes of such as were taken  
out upon Service. It is Ordained

That it shall be full satisfaction and that Capt Baker Brook (or  
in other Execution thereof) issue forth his warrants accordingly  
of 10<sup>th</sup> all persons concerned are to take due cognizance and  
punctually obey same.

At a Council held at Manahowuket Nick Plant: in Wicocomo-  
mico River the 27<sup>th</sup> Day of August anno 1678:

The Empiro: with three other great men of Pascattaway then appeared  
according to appointment before Council Day of whom Maj: William Boarman was Ord: to demand their Answer to what  
had formerly offered to them in relation to a late murder committed at  
the head of Pottuxen River w<sup>ch</sup> as w<sup>t</sup> had already told them for w<sup>t</sup>  
w<sup>t</sup> held of the same Opinion and had all reason in the world to believe  
was done by some of their Indians - So w<sup>t</sup> after several long &  
principulatory Discourses offray of Excuse they replied & positively  
affirmed that they were altogether ignorant of it, and that notwithstanding  
they had made all Diligent Inquisition amongst their Indians touching  
the same, yett could not discover that any of them had committed the  
same. Whereupon the Indians are Ord: for som: time to withdraw  
and the Councell take into consideration to concide what further
