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Lord now for two of them here, and there for he is forced to speak
which he did not intend to do at this time, but for they know now before
his face he demands the Emper. to deliver them up according to
his Articles, that Ararans and Manahawton are the two off sons w.
his Lopp did demand.

So w. they answer they know nothing of it and say that none of them
Indians had done any mischief to the English since his Lopp's departure.
Whereupon the Interpreter was ordered to reply that certain it was the
murder was committed & that we did as certainly know those two
off sons already named and demanded to be guilty, w. God had so ordered
by preserving the life of the Woman so long as to reveal the same.
and that therefore his Lopp did again demand the delivery of them up if
they expected we should continue peace with them, and further that there was
yet another off son w. his Lopp did likewise expect should be delivered up,
where they should be required so to do, that his Lopp had not designed to have
made this demand now but that he saw the murderers now before his face
expecting that they would voluntarily of themselves have delivered them up
according to their Articles.

To all w. the Emper. and great men plead ignorance still affirming that
they know nothing of it.

The Interpreter was then ordered to let them know that although his Lopp
was very well satisfied that Ararans and Manahawton then present were
guilty of the murder and might justly be apprehended for the same. Yet his Lopp
was unwilling so to do until he had first legally demanded the delivery of
them, and did therefore now again make his demand; Whereat the
Emper. and his great men being at a stand without making any Reply
his Lopp by the Interpreter desired them to go apart by themselves and
consider of what had been delivered to them, which they refused to
do saying they knew nothing they had to consider of.

Whereupon his Lopp did again by the Interpreter make demand of
the murderers to w. they still say they know nothing and can therefore
say nothing to that point.

Capt. Edward Th. and Lt. Thomas Courtney are then ordered to take
Ararans and Manahawton into their custody and secure them until
further order. W. being done and the prisoners carried forth, the Interpreter
was ordered to give the Emper. and his great men a particular Discourse of the
said Murder from the beginning according to the relation received from the Woman
her self before her Death and for all others relating to the Discovery thereof.
W. the Interpreter having accordingly informed they answered as before that
they knew nothing of it and therefore had nothing to say to it.

His Lopp was then pleased to tell them that he was willing to think that
possibly they might not know of it, but that himself and his Council were
certainly convinced in the truth thereof, and that there was yet another
off son concerned in the murder whom his Lopp did expect they should deliver up
if they intended to preserve peace and amity with us
