Arund. & Baltimore County not being returned, could not proceed therein but referred it laying thereof untill Tuesday the 23rd Day of this instant November the first Day of the next Prov^l Court, and ordered that notice thereof be given to all persons therein concerned to have their claims ready to put in at any time appointed w^{ch} was accordingly done by following ord^r of Councill affixed to the Court Doore at y^e State house viz

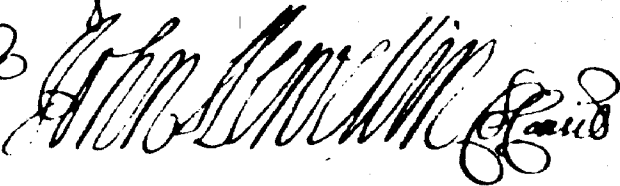

Whereas at a Councill held at y^e State house this Second Day of November Anno 1680: according to appointm^t for the laying and assessing of the publick Levy of this Province this present year, his Ex^{ty} and his Councill through the negligence of the Sheriffs of St. Maris Ann. Arund. & Baltimore Counties in not returning their lists of Tythables in convenient time have been wholly Disappointed, and could not now proceed to lay the same, but have referred the assessing thereof to the first Day of the next Prov^l Court

There are therefore to give notice that on Tuesday the three and twentieth Day of this instant November is the Day appointed by his Ex^{ty} & his Councill to lay and assess the publick Levy of this Province in the Councill room in the State house at y^e City of St. Maris whereof all persons concerned are to take cognizance that they have their Demands Ready to present to his Ex^{ty} and Councill at y^e time and place aforesaid
