- 1: Upon the perusal of the Records of the Provincial Office from the Arrival of the late Governour Lopley, we find all the Proceedings of the said Office from that time until May Court last fully Entered, which said Court Proceedings, the Minutes thereof were taken by Mr L. W. Kim, upon Mr Taylors being sick, and the said Mr Taylor has now promised to be engaged to complete all business of this time left undone, within two Months after the next Court, & ready to be delivered up to his Honor the Secretary.
- 2: We find the Books of Comptrolers in the said Office fully preserved.
- 3: We find no Chancery Proceedings Entered since the year 1682, except one Docket under Vanfoutrighen & Taylor, and as to any Minutes thereto belonging, Mr Taylor can give no Account; therefore is referred to be inquired after by the former Clerks of the Office, viz. Mr Granin & Mr Brothby.
- 4: We find all Criminal business in Mr Brothby's time Entered up, but all the Judgments of his time want still to be Entered.
- 5: We find all Judgments in Mr Halls time Entered, but not Alphabetically.
- 6: A Criminal book taken out of the Office by Capt. John Good when he went for England, but not yet returned.
- 7: Upon perusal of the Records belonging to the Comptrolers Office, we find only sixteen Wills & seven Inventories Entered since the Arrival of the Governour, until this time.
- 8: We cannot make any certain Return what business remains in the said Office unpreserved, nor what Parliamentary Proceedings have been returned from the several Deputy Comptrolers, for want of information from the Clerk of that Office, who lies sick.
