 can be found out without particular directions from the R<sup>ty</sup> Hon<sup>ty</sup>.

 Customs. I therefore desire your Ex<sup>cy</sup> in Council to grant me  
 Leave to go for England with this fleet that I may Represent  
 what I find most proper for their Mat<sup>y</sup> Service, all which is
