Council Late

Resolved the Ships be all cleared to go to Puttuck  
-cut when ready to Saylor. But that their severall  
Clearances be left with the Customhouse Offi-  
-cers not to be deliverd the Commanders untill  
they shall receive his Excellency's Direction so to doe

His Excellency acquaints the Board that  
Complaint has been made to him on behalf  
of Divers Indians living in Charles County -  
that a Tomb wherein an Indian Queen is buried  
has been broke open & robb'd of divers goods of a  
considerable value stolen thence by English men  
& women living contiguous to the Indian Land

He desired to have the opinion of the Board -  
therein what they thinke most proper to be done  
for the relief of the Complainants.

Advised & Ordered that Strict inquiry be  
made after the Offenders & that upon their being  
taken they be bound over to the next Provinciale  
Court there to be prosecuted according to the  
utmost Severity of the Law -

His Excellency asking the Advice of the  
Board what sort of acquittance the Coll<sup>rs</sup> of the  
severall Countys ought to give for the Arms
