 Upon her Death the Lords of the Privy Council immediately
 assembled at St. James's, and gave Orders for proclaiming
 the most High and Mighty Prince George Elector of Brun-
 swick Lunenburg, King of Great Britain, France, & Ireland.
 His Majesty was accordingly Proclam'd: the usual
 Solemnity before the Gate of His Palace at St. James's, at
 Charing Cross, at Temple Bar, at the End of Wood Street in
 the City and lastly at the Royal Exchange Great Numbers
 of the Nobility and Principall Gentry assisted at each Procla-
 mation, and attended in their Coaches during the whole
 Solemnity. —
