A Proclamation

It is remembered last this Lenten season that it was thought fit that the exportation of Indian Commodities should be prohibited until the tenth of March next which was accordingly done by Proclamation to that purpose. But for that the winter has since proved very favourable & mild & is pretty far advanced, insomuch that there seems not to be any absolute necessity to continue the said prohibition. To the end his Majesty's good Subjects of this Province may take the best advantage of the Markets that are by the advice of his Majesty's Council thought fit to take off the embargo as a safe way to the said Commodities by this my Proclamation direct I command & require the respective Officers of his Majesty's Customs within this Province to take notice thereof to the said Commodities to be loaded to Indian Commodities if the said prohibition had as been been by an embargo laid. And to let all persons may have notice hereof I do hereby command the respective Sheriffs to publish this my Proclamation in the most usual & frequented places in their several Counties. Given at the City of Annapolis this 18<sup>th</sup> day of June in the first year of King George's reign.
