

in America and their Trade Settlements in those
parts by the advice of his Majesties Council of State and the Col-
lection of State, thereto and of Treaties between the Kingdom
of Great Britain and France concluded the 16th day of April
1686. The said Articles of which Treaty, in
sets and inhabitants of each Kingdom are prohibited
to trade and fish in all places possessed by the other in
America and if any Ships shall be found trading contrary
thereto, Treaty upon due proof shall be Confiscated, but in
case of Subjects of either King, shall be forced by the Captains
of either Province or other Acceſſity into the Ports of the
other in America they shall be treated w^m Humanity &
kindness & may provide themselves w^m Victuals and other
things necessary for their sustenance & Separation of
their Ships at reasonable rates, provided they do not
break Bulk nor carrying Goods out of their Ships
excepting them to sell nor receiving Merchandise
on Board under the Speculations of Confiscation of Ships
already

And where as by several Articles of his Majesties Council
to the Captain of his Majesties Ships of War the Captains
are expressly restricted from taking any Goods or Merchandise
lading on Board their Ships, have therefore by the
Advice of his Majesties Council in that Provice
thought fit to issue this my Proclamation in his Majestys
Name, strictly charging and requiring all the Captains
of his Majestys good Subjects in this Province especially
the Commanders of any of his Majestys Ships & Officers
of his Majestys Customs of the said Provice to Endeavour
and cause
