being the practice of physick, often being sick, and  
about nine months agoe. He being sick, sent it her  
w<sup>om</sup>en, in which she found the Letter, Her Husband  
would have had it, but she layd it by, bound some  
Ribband over it saying if the Roman Catholicks,  
who are people who have done her some prejudices,  
had any ill designs, she thought they were frustrated,

And says she has been assaulted upon this point,  
and conceivd fear of her life, after Good Seymour died,  
by people that could have no prejudice to her.

M<sup>r</sup> James Carroll appearing at the Board, and  
being sworn upon the Holy Evangelist, & to give  
true and direct answers, to such questions, as should  
be asked him, His Excellency asked him, if he ever
