Whereupon his Honour the Governor delivered to the
said Indians a just & impartial judgment & the Indians of
the Company to the same. I seal with this Judgment by the
Governor of Pennsylvania further Declaration to the Governor
of New York with a letter letter sent from New York sette forth
as follows viz.

The Seneca Indians had an opportunity to review
Same with his Majestys. Subjects. Introducing this subject they
recounted the Occasion and Reasons of this letter which is by me
to do a promise made them upon a long time of Squares done
thereby the Seneca Indians as were strangers to the facts
and Guards of the Kings guards with your Indians
our Council did not think fit to engage further in the affair than
to shew our Readiness to and do our parts in Compromising all
matters in dispute between those and our friend Indians and
therefore promised to write to your Honour in their favour. I
would not have your Honour believe that I had any manner
of doubt in me that any good Offices towards the Composing
of that difference would be any way wanting on your part
yet to express our Good will to those Indians that are inimicaly
with us by a peace treated on and concluded with them at
Albany 1682 on the behalf of Maryland and Virginia too &
Confirmit at the head of our Bay 1685 our Council thought
it very proper for me to entreat your Honours kind Endeavours
accordingly as the merit of the Case shall require / to let Justice
