We wish well to the Lord Traitorous his Secretary
& the Province

We wish well to your Great King and all our Indian
Friends

We wish peace and Friendship between us Christians
and all our friend Indians forever

The Governor signet a pass for the said Indians to the
several Ferry men of Southhampton and Hamptons
to suffer the said Indians to pass over the said river without
pay the said ferrymen to be paid by the publick

His Honour the Governor sent to the Governor of
Virginia about the Indian Affairs as follows viz

Sir

Some Representatives of Peoples from the several
Nations have been down to renew their former articles of peace
with this Province and as I have with the Advice of my
Council made some changes therein with them I thought
it might not be Impudent to communicate to you our proce-
dings with them which I therefore inclose you and beg you
to be referred to them and least the proceedings of ^{the} Geno: & Virg: Govt
should not yet become to your hands I take
care to send you what I have in print of them
