

informal that Captain John Stansfieldman is come to town and has sent his son back to him from the Indians who he was sent for fear of the Indians the frontier inhabitants are altogether incapable of making any defense having neither power nor skill I have sent a due letter lately to the Superintendents and Indians by that of the marchioness brought to her the Indians will appear no more, same will highly obliged for your kind promises to use your influence with his excellency that proper measures may be taken to peaceable settle with the Indians on this unhappy occasion

Sir

Annapolis February 21. 1721

Colonel Tidson having communicated this day to the Council Board two letters from you relating to the murder of one James Quebec Indian committed by one John Cartlidge in company with his Brother John. Cartlidge both Indians at Longsoga it is the opinion of this Board that by all means possible you continue to let the Indians know that the Minutemen are under the Pennsylvanian government and that we are in ways concerned in it, and at the same time assure them that we shall write to the Governor of Pennsylvania that they may have full payment for the injury done them, and that our agents now will always remain in perfect friendship with them.
