Power that will the Indians cannot longer be main-
tained and that Trade is not only lost but we gain
much ill-will and therefore the Lord Pro-
prietor or the Country would purchase Indian Goods to the
value of 200 £ Sterling first and place the same with
some careful honest man for sale; it would be a great
means to keep Friends with the Indians without Charge
(if the Petersons did no more than keep up the first Stock)
and Ban the other Americans from trading here, who
have been the occasion of this Unusuall, and perhaps may
ruin us much more; I hope your Excellency's Goodness will
justify this freedom having no other design but his Lord-
ships Interest and Safety of his Tenants
