Whittington William Sanders Bonard Bevers Joseph
Houlston James Taylor and George Nicholson

They are thereupon told that their Grievances shall
be redressed but that they must pay the Lord Proprietary
Bonard Indian Taxes as a acknowledgement
for their Land
