had been possessed with that good understanding
which is usual between Neighbours Subjects of the
same Crown the first will without any just cause
be given to excuse in the Queen to make any Vac-
ation of the same

That as our founder for solid Reasons drew
from the Charter what services claimed to the South
ward of Chester and it had formerly always been under-
stood by this Government that the Lord Baltimore made
no Claim to the Northward of that Creek or River of
which better proofs may be given than some in Mary-
land are willing to admit of those of this Province were
therefore of Opinion that to bound themselves by the
same limits the Lord Baltimore had prescribed to him-
self, could never be the cause of any dispute with a Government
with which they laboured to maintain a perfect Amity
and good Understanding
