

Accordinging to what we had the Honor to write you last month by your Messenger we never sent you the Copy of three Laws now subsisting for the Improvement of our Tobacco Trade and shall be glad if any of the regulations thereby established prove equal to the despositons and Circumstances of the people in your Province.

The Bill which we last mentioned to be their understanding will shortly be rejected by the House of Burgesses and the chief Reason was because it had a restraint upon the People and Shipping of Virginia while those of your Province were at liberty to supply the markets at home and towns of the Year and not being sure that Maryland would come in under such restriction they thought it not advisable to pass a Law which gave their Neighbours political advantage over them and thus a project miscarried which we judged would have proved useful to the Trade by preventing that unreasonable supplying the British Markets with new Tobacco before the Old Crop can be sold off which is certainly one great cause of keeping the price of that commodity so low.

We send Inclosed a Copy of that Bill as it was prepared by the Upper House and for perusal of it your Assembly shall think fit to come in other measures we shall be Glad to receive timely advice being in hopes it will meet with no Obstruction in the next Session of Assembly which now stands Prorogued to the seventeenth of November.

We cannot but greatly commend that publick spirit and zeal with which you are pursuing the common Good of all those concerned in the Tobacco Manufacture and desirous you will give us a hearty concurrence with you in promoting that laudable design, being with great Truth
