

First I was engaged by him to drive a quantity of Hays, which I did in about a Month, and then took leave of Virginia and came to Balsorore County where I spent all the ensuing summer, labouring for him for Richard Blood; then with one M. O'Donals or Donalson a Fuller, and for one Days with Darby (toot a Shoemaker who has but one Leg, whence he had no more business for me) engaged to grub and to break a piece of Meadow for poor Penshaw, who lives about a mile from Ashmores Mill, and entred into Bond for the due performance of my contract within a certain limited time while I was making this Meadow I married Elizabeth the Daughter of one William Deale who dwelt at that time in the stony Forrest, near Jacob Bull's Mill, but she lived as a Servant with one John Darumple on a plantation that he rented of John Wimpes, and that lies near Abraham Ferrand; for about 3³ Months I laboured hard in hopes of being able to make the Meadow according to Agreement, but finding it impossible at the end of that time Dr Penshaw at the same time threatening me with the penalty of the Bond went off to York town in Pennsylvania, and Lieutenant Miller a tall

Gentleman somewhat advanced in Years being recruiting there I was enlisted by him for Captain Clark's Company, and was soon after sent to Fort Cumberland Colonal Lums was then commander in chief at that Fort, and Captain Rutherford commanded under him, I was there when your Excellency arrived just before Christmas but was then meditating my Escape, being determined to return, if possible back to my Wife or fly into one of the neighbouring provinces I send for her thither. One Hancock who lived with Bernard Pendrago of Maryland came frequently among us and as I apprehended he was well acquainted with all that part of the Country, I entered into conversation with him on that subject and from him learnt that there was a path from Fort Cumberland thro' Maryland to Pennsylvania behind any of the Maryland settlements, being thus advised I deserted in the Month of January with one Williby Willitt of Captain Rutherford's Company intending to go thro' Maryland and pursue the Road that Hancock had described to us. We had not got more than a Mile or two before night approached, and returning again as I apprehended to his post, I soon after missed my Way and travelled of Days without getting any. I afterwards understood more than 20 Miles from the Fort and the Weather being very severe one of my feet was frost bitten, and I was ready to perish with cold and Hunger, when
