

- your Passage that all the Prisoners be well treated according to their Ranks.
34. On your Arrival at Port St. Louis you are to have my Commission for Exchange of Prisoners to be shewn to his Excellency Monsieur De Mont Captain in the Navy and Lieutenant General of French Hispaniola & to the Commander in Chief of Port St. Louis and to make known to him that you have brought so many French Prisoners to be exchanged for such British Subjects as may be Prisoners there according to the terms of my Commission.
35. You are not to put any of the French Prisoners one more before the Commander in Chief shall have agreed with you that British Subjects are in his Government as Prisoners of War and shall have agreed with you as to the numbers of them to be delivered up in Exchange pursuant to my said Commission and if there should not be an equal Number of British Subjects to be exchanged for French Prisoners you are to take what British Prisoners there are and equal certificates from the Governor or Commander in Chief setting forth that he hath received those Prisoners sent by you and what Number he returns in Exchange.
36. If there be any Prisoners there lately Inhabitants of or belonging to Maryland you are to insist that they be of the Number delivered to you in Exchange.
37. When you have got the British Prisoners on Board you are to Daire a Passport or safe conduct from the Governor or Commander in Chief to protect you and the said Pass from be molested by any Men of War Prisoners or Subjects of the most Christian King or any of his Allies.
38. You are to take and not to offer any insults to any of the Subjects of his most Christian Majority or his Allies nor carry any kind of Harsh Orders or Provisions except what is necessary for the Maintenance of the Crew and Prisoners.
39. You are not to carry any more than two Pieces of Cannon nor hire any guns unless as a signal or for a Pilot.
40. You are to wear English Colours with a White Ensign on your main Top Mast so that it may be seen.
41. You are to bring to for every Officer that shall Demand it shewing your proper Colours of my Commission and not to make resistance against any one.
