We do hereby represent unto Your Excellency, that, pursuant to His Lordships Commission to us directed, a Court of Assize by the Justices and Gaol Delivery was holden before us for the County of Dorset, at the Court House, within the Town of Cambridge in the said County, on Monday the twelfth day of September One Thousand seven hundred and sixty eight, at which Court Philip Fitzgerald was Convict on full Evidence, by Verdict of a Jury, for feloniously breaking and entering the Store House of Clement Bailey, not being contiguous to or used with any Mansion House, and thereout feloniously taking sundry Goods Wares and Merchandizes, and the said Philip being asked if any thing he had to say wherefore Judgment of Death should not pass on the said Verdict, according to Law, He did make Answer that nothing he had to say, therefore Judgment of Death was pronounced as usual, all which may more fully appear to your Excellency by the Transcript of the Record.
