That the said Treasurers gave to James Esq. fifty pounds, eight
shillings and six pence agreeably to the Act to quiet the Debt due from the
said Treasurers paper.

It appearing by the Certificate of the Clerk of Brecknock County
that a writ was returned against Joseph Williams in the sum of ten
pounds for the appearance of Joseph Mellon which was forfeited by
the non appearance of Mellon and Execution issued thereon against the said
Joseph Williams in the representation of the Magistrate of Brecknock County
that James Esq. the Clerk of the Court Mellon removed to Pennsylvania and
his name is not known at the time of the Execution being issued
that the said sum of ten pounds should be remitted Joseph Williams paying
the said debt already accrued

It appearing from the representation of James Esq. the
Magistrate of Brecknock County that William Cummings an Antient Inhabitant of
that County was fined twenty five pounds for Disturbing the King of England's Health, as
James Esq. it afterwards appeared more than probable that he was not guilty
Wherefore the said fine of Twenty five pounds is remitted
