

the quantity more than he could pay for he agreed to dispose of twenty Gallons to a certain Nathaniel Ford, but the winter setting in so very severe that Mr. Ford could not take it all away at once, he sent for it occasionally in small quantities under ten Gallons, by means of which, the above fine was inflicted on him - that he had not the least intention of violating the Law, is very poor, and has a large family of Children - and three of the Justices of the said County certifying their belief of the facts stated in his Petition; and recommending him to the Consideration and Mercy of Government - The Board do in consideration of all the Circumstances of his Case, direct that the fine of six pounds be remitted
