

The Petition of George Leggett of Baltimore Town praying  
the remission of a forfeited recognizance of ten pounds for the appearance of a  
certain Simon. Sent at January term last of Baltimore County Court was  
read and rejected. -

In Council April 21. 1791.

By the Petition of Thomas Beale of Baltimore  
County it is represented that he entered into a recognizance in the penalty of forty  
five pounds for the appearance of a certain James M'Dowell at the Court  
of Oyer and terminer &c. for the said County, soon after which the said  
M'Dowell absconded and the Petitioner has been at considerable expense in  
endeavouring to have him brought back to Justice without effect. - That execution  
has issued on the forfeiture and the Petitioner has in consequence been put  
into prison, being unable to pay the Money - He further represents that he has  
a large family who are suffering greatly through his confinement. - The  
Board having reason to believe by the recommendation of three Justices  
of the aforesaid Court that the Petitioner is through his poverty and his nume-  
-rous family a proper object of clemency, do order that the above forfeiture  
of forty five pounds, be remitted, on the Petitioner's paying all legal costs  
which have accrued thereon

In Council April 21. 1791

Nicholas Walter an inhabitant of Pennsylvania by his  
Petition to the Board sets forth, that he was presented at last March Court  
of Frederick County in this State for vending Goods in the said County as a  
Hawker or Pedler contrary to an Act of Assembly in such case made &c.  
provided and was by the said Court fined ten pounds which also appears  
by a transcript accompanying the Petition. - He represents that he is poor  
and has a large family of small Children to support and in his endeavor  
to provide for them he transgressed without knowledge or intentions against  
the Act of Assembly - that the payment of the said fine would reduce  
and his numerous family to greater poverty and distress - and
