

In Council December 19<sup>th</sup> 1792

By the Petition of the Chief Justice of Dorchester County, and his Associates with other inhabitants of the said County in behalf of Isaac Moore of said County, it appears that at last March term, presentments were found by the Grand Jury of said County against the said Isaac Moore for selling Cyder and suffering the same to be drank about his house contrary to act of Assembly, the truth of the Charges, fifteen in number, the said Isaac Moore has not attempted to deny, and in consequence of his confession thereof he now stands charged on the Records of Dorchester County Court with the sum of three pounds fifteen shillings as the fine imposed for each of the said Offences and with the Costs of Prosecution. That tho' Moore has offended against the letter of the Law, yet the Petitioners have reason to believe he the said Moore does not deserve the rigour of it - that he is quite a young man, has never before or since, been accused of any such breaches of the Law and is spoken of as a man of an amiable and amiable and good Character - that the said Moore from the information the Petitioners have received is not one of those disorderly Members of Society who keep what are commonly called tippling houses, and that all the aforesaid Offences were
