Given in Council at the City of Annapolis under the Great Seal of the State of Maryland this twelfth day of September seventeen hundred and Ninety six.

By the Petition of Edward Creamer of Baltimore County it appears, that at August Term seventeen hundred and Ninety six he was fined on three several Presentments by the Associate Justices of Baltimore County Criminal Court the Sums of fifty pounds Current Money on one presentment and five pounds each on the other two for resisting and assaulting the Watch on Fells Point in the execution of their duty, and is now in actual confinement, and whereas it is represented by the recommendation of several respectable Citizens of Baltimore Town, that the said Creamer is a very poor man with a helpless and increasing family whose support, depends upon his labour and industry, and that the payment of so large a Sum of Money would greatly distress and ruin them. The Board on Consideration of the Circumstances and from the recommendation aforesaid do order and direct that the said Edward Creamer be released from the aforesaid fines on payment of Costs of Suit.
