Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay to Messieurs Cuthmey and Munroe thirty two pounds eleven Shillings and ten pence as per account paper.

Ordered that the Treasurer of the Western Shore pay to Mr. Joseph Dawson ten Dollars for one quarters half pay due the first day of last Month.

By the Representation of the Court of Queen Annes County it appears that a certain Andrew Baburgh is confined in the Prison of Queen Annes County on an execution which issued out of the said Court on a forfeited Recognizance which he entered into to answer a charge of an assault and Battery which charge he has answered by submitting his case to the Court. The Board on consideration of which circumstances and from the recommendation of the Court of the said County do remit the said forfeited Recognizance.

By the Petition of Jacob Grop Henry Leatherman and Henry Grop accompanied by a Transcript from the Proceedings of the Court of Frederick County it appears that they entered into a Recognizance for the appearance of Jacob Grop at August Term eighteen hundred and seven to answer a charge of felony in stealing a Purse of Money containing seventeen Dollars and thirty two Cents. The Petitioners state that the said Jacob Grop in consequence of his being engaged in driving a Waggon to Fort Pitt did not appear at Court according to the term of said Recognizance. They further state that Henry Grop served as a faithful Soldier during our Revolutionary War. that he is in reduced circumstances and has a Wife and a number of Children dependant on him for support. that Jacob Grop is not worth any thing and that Henry Leatherman joined in the Recognizance from charitable Motives. The Board on consideration of which circumstances and from the recommendation of the Court of the said County do remit the said Recognizance.
