

Minard Pinkney was unanimously re-appointed Clerk of the Council and immediately qualified before James Hunter Esquire, one of the Justices of the Peace for Anne Arundel County by taking and subscribing the several oaths and declaration prescribed for that purpose by the Constitution and by the laws of this State and the United States.

State of Maryland to wit. In Council Annapolis  
December the twenty first 1819. To all whom it may concern  
C. S. Konig, Esquire, having produced to the Executive an Exequator signed by the President of the United States, and Sealed with the seal of the said States recognizing him as Consul of his Majesty the King of the Netherlands, for the Port of Baltimore and places thereto belonging. Ordered, that the said Recognition be published for the information and government of the people of this State. Given under my hand and the seal of the State of Maryland, this twenty first day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

To all whom it may concern, C. S. Konig having produced to me his commission, as Consul of his Majesty the King of the Netherlands, for the Port of Baltimore and places thereto belonging, I hereby recognize him as such and declare him free to exercise and enjoy such functions, powers and privileges, as are allowed to the most favoured nations in the United States. In Testimony whereof I have caused these letters to be made patent, and the seal of the United States to be hereunto affixed. Given under my hand at the city of Washington this seventh day of November, A. D. 1819 and of the independence of the United States of America the 44<sup>th</sup>.
