The honorable James Butcher appeared in the Council chamber and gave in before Thomas H. Carroll, Esquire, Recorder of the City of New York, a copy of several oaths required by the Constitution and form of government and laws of this State, and by subscribing a declaration of his belief in the Christian Religion, and also by taking an oath to support the Constitution of the United States.

The Council met Present His Excellency the Governor, and the honorable Isaac D. Maulsby, Nicholas Breeser, James Butcher and James Saib.

By a transcript from the Proceedings of Kent County Court, it appears, that Edmund S. Ray, was fined by the said Court, at March term eighteen hundred and twenty two, for selling soap and candles without license. It appearing further from the statement of the Court, that the said Edmund S. Ray is a young man, and a stranger living in the State of Delaware, and had no intention of violating the law, and conceived that he was not committing any offence by selling the said articles, and they having recommended a remission of the said fine, it is ordered by the Board, that the said Edmund S. Ray be released from the said fine, of ten pounds.
