buying said whiskey one opinion. Murphy, a near neighbor of the petitioner, had  
importuned the petitioner to sell him a pint of whiskey, which he did merely to oblige  
Murphy and without any intention of violating the law. That at November term he was  
fined by the Court of the said County, the sum of sixteen dollars. The Board do on the  
recommendation of the said Court, remit the said fine of sixteen dollars.

By the Petition of Charles Rice, of Washington County, accompanied by a  
script from the Proceedings of the Court of the said County, it appears that he was fined in  
three cases by the said Court, at March 1822 the sum of ten dollars in each case, for selling  
in the month of June 1821, spirituous liquors without license. The petitioner states that in  
the month of November 1820 he took out a license to retail Dry goods for one year, for which  
he paid eight dollars and fifty cents to the Clerk of Washington County Court. That when he  
took out license it was his opinion and belief that he could also sell liquors. The petitioner  
states that he is poor, having a large family to support, that his store is small. The Board agree that  
considered all the circumstances attending this case, and from the recommendation of the Court  
of the said County, do remit the said three fines of ten dollars each.
