

By the Petition of Arthur Frege it appears that he was presented by the grand jury of Dorchester County Court at April Term eighteen hundred and twenty two in six cases for selling spirituous liquors on the Sabbath and keeping a disorderly house. The Petitioner states that he came forward at October Term 1822 and in consequence of the non attendance of the witnesses entered into Recognizances in the sum of twenty Pounds in each Presentment. That he continued to appear from Court to Court until April Term 1824 at which time he was prevented by indisposition from attending and the several Recognizances were forfeited by the Court. That at October Term ensuing there were issued against him six Capias ad satisfaciendum for the said forfeited Recognizances which were levied and the Petitioner committed to the County Prison where he must remain unless released by the clemency of the Executive. He further states that he is very poor and has a wife and several children in extreme want while deprived of his assistance. The Board do on consideration of which circumstances and from the recommendation of the Court of said County remit the said forfeited Recognizances.
