By the Petition of Ladbokh Riston it appears that he was recognized in the Court of Prince Georges as a security for the appearance of his daughter Eliza Riston before Prince Georges County Court at April term 1825 to testify against a certain John Payne against whom the said Eliza Riston had before the Justice of the peace for the County, ~~as~~ sworn that he had attempted to commit a rape upon her. The Petitioner states under his oath that he was always desirous that his said daughter should appear at Court according to the tenor of the said Recognizance, and was in no wise instrumental to her failure to do so, but just before the term she was without the knowledge or consent of the petitioner carried to Virginia (by a brother of hers who resided there, and was of opinion that the prosecution aforesaid would tend only to degrade and debar his said sister) and remained there until after the Court at which he was as aforesaid recognized to appear, whereby the said Recognizance was forfeited, and a Case having been issued and served upon the Petitioner for the recovery thereof and he being wholly unable to pay the same is now confined in the Jail of the said County, worn out with age and infirmity. The petitioner also states that he was a soldier in the Revolution. He therefore prays that the said forfeiture be remitted, and the said Court having stated their belief that the petitioner's statement of facts is true, and recommended a compliance with his prayer. The board do hereby release him from the said forfeiture.
