

By the Petition of George Dunlop accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Prince George's County Court it appears that he was fined by the said Court at a certain term 1820 the sum of fifty dollars, the informer, half of which has been received. The Petitioner states that he is a free coloured man and a Licensed retailer in said County. That in the year eight hundred and twenty the above fine was imposed on him under the provisions of the act passed at December Session 1817 Chap 227 prohibiting retailers from permitting free blacks and slaves to be in their houses and stores after sunset. He further states that he was entirely ignorant of said law and therefore hopes the Executive will remit the fine or that portion of it, which is by said Law to be paid the County, that it is the first instance of his violating any Law, and was from his ignorance of the existence of the same innocent of any intention to do so, that his circumstances are such that he should be entirely ruined unless the Executive will interpose in his favour. and the Court having recommended that the prayer of the Petitioner be granted. The board do hereby remit the said fine.

By the Petition of James Baden Hugh Perrie and Thomas G Baden accompanied by transcripts from the Records of Prince George's County Court it appears that the said Hugh Perrie and James Baden were under recognizance in the sum of fifty dollars each for the said Hugh Perrie appeared before the said County Court at a April term 1824 to testify for that the said Thomas G Baden and James Baden were under a like recognizance for the appearance of the said Thomas G Baden to testify for and that the said James Baden and Hugh Perrie were under a like recognizance for the appearance of the said James Baden to testify for. The said Petitioners represent that each of them did attend the said Court the first day of its sitting and were severally examined by the grand Jury, that being ignorant of its being their duty to attend at the calling of the criminal Docket when the prisoner against whom they were witnesses had previously made his escape from jail, and being also informed by the attorney for the state that they would not be wanting any more that Court, they ignorant of the consequences attended no more that term and their said Recognizances were forfeited. They therefore pray to be released from said forfeiture. The board do hereby remit the same.
