By the Petition of George Weaver, accompanied by a transcript from the Records of Baltimore County Court it appears that he had entered into a recognizance with his son David Weaver, in the sum of thirty pounds each, for the appearance of the said David Weaver before the said County Court to answer for being the father of an illegitimate child: which said recognizance was forfeited at March Term 1823 of said Court. The Petitioner represents that he is under execution for the said forfeiture, and that he is unable to pay it, and prays that it may be remitted. And the Honble Charles W. Hanson one of the Judges of the said Court having recommended the remission, the said forfeiture is hereby remitted.

Ordered that all the Civil officers who hold their appointments from the Governor and Council, and who do not hold commissions during good behaviour, and who have not been superseded by other appointments, be continued in the offices they respectively hold.

His Excellency the Governor this day granted a Pardon to John Satterfield, who has been convicted by Baltimore County Court of Forgery and sentenced to the Penitentiary: he having been recommended to mercy by the Directors of the Penitentiary, and many other respectable Citizens.
