

that the said John Lamb was his apprentice, and that the chastisement which he gave him, was drawn upon him by repeated acts of the most improper and provoking conduct.

The Petitioner states that he has always borne the character of a peaceable and quiet Citizen, neither given to quarrel with his fellow Citizens, nor to cruel or arbitrary deportment towards his dependants; that his circumstances are such that the payment of a fine of such magnitude would be excessively burthensome to him at the present time, when every kind of business and trade is languishing in consequence of the great scarcity of money. He, therefore, prays that himself, and John Russell, by his death may be released from the said fine. And many respectable Citizens, of the City of Annapolis, bearing testimony to the facts stated by the petitioner, and recommending him to the mercy of the Executive. — the said fine is hereby remitted.
