Proposals for delivering the Laws and Notes and proceedings  
of the present Session of the Legislature, and other public documents required to be  
distributed by the Executive, to the Clerks of the several Counties of the State, will  
be received at this Department, until the 10th day of April next, in due  
agent will be appointed for each Shore.

Ordered that the Clerk of the Council, in case the Executive  
shall not be in Session on the 10th day of April next, give notice to such  
person or persons, as may propose to deliver the Laws and Notes and proceedings  
for the least sum or sums, of the acceptance of such offer or offers.
