It appears by the petition that on the 11th June 1829, the Petitioner took out license as an Ordinary Keeper, which license was dated back to 1. May; and having mislaid it, and relying on his memory, he did not call to renew it, until the 12 or 13 June 1830. That the office was closed, & found closed on three several visits of a friend who was furnished with money to renew the said license; in consequence of which he has been fined. >

And the Court having under the circumstances recommended a remission of the fine, we do therefore hereby remit it.
