By the petition of many respectable Inhabitants of Frederick City, it
appears, that George Robertson a young stranger of respectable appearance
is confined in the Jail of Frederick County, under a sentence of Frederick County
Court to pay a fine of Fifty dollars, for selling liquor without a license.

The petition states, that the said George Robertson while in the employ-
ment of one of the Citizens of Frederick County being an entire stranger and
ignorant of the Laws, sold liquor at the Horse races held at Frederick in the
October preceding, for which he was fined by the Court that he has been
in jail for five months, is without money, and has no friends within several
hundred miles. The Petitioner therefore pray a remission of his fine, in
which one of the Associate Judges of the County Court joins. We therefore
deeming this a fit case for Executive clemency do hereby accredit the
said fine.

By the petition of William Schenckly accompanied by a transcript
from the record it appears that at March Term 1820 of Washington
County Court, he was fined in one cpl. Ten pounds Current money, and
in another cpl. Fifty dollars for selling merchandise without li-
cense.

The petition states that the petitioner has for several years
been a merchant in Hager's Town, and has regularly obtained li-
cense. That his omission to do so in this case, proceeded from
neglect, and not from any desire to defraud the State. And his case
being recommended to our favorable consideration by the Court and
by many respectable Citizens of Hager's Town, we do therefore
remit the said fine.
