Accustomed as we have been to enjoy the sweet delights of civil liberty, our sympathies are immediately enlisted in favour of any people gallantly defending their rights; but towards the Nation which cheerfully came to our aid in the hour of peril, when we were struggling for our own liberties, the most ardent invocations to Heaven should be offered, that it may continue successfully to maintain principles which will necessarily lead to the establishment of a government, whose basis shall be entire political freedom and whose only objects, the prosperity and happiness of the people.

The Clerk of the Council by direction of the Governor delivered the following Communication, in the Senate Chamber.

Annapolis, Dec. 30<sup>th</sup> 1830.

Gentlemen of the Senate

& of the House of Delegates.

Since making a Communication to you yesterday, other proposals for executing the public printing, have been received, and I have deemed it proper to take the earliest opportunity to transmit them.

The sum of One thousand dollars appropriated by a resolution of the last general assembly, for the purchase of furniture, and for making repairs at the Government House has at last been entirely expended. The Steward of the Government House has been directed to forward with the Inventory of the furniture, a list of the articles purchased by me, with the prices thereof.

There remained of the fund appropriated for the purposes aforesaid, Two Hundred and Eighteen dollars and fifty eight Cents, which sum has been returned, as will appear by a receipt of the Treasurer, and will be found among the Vouchers forwarded by the Steward.
