

of his agreement with Sparrow, a copartnership and consequently, that he was not  
authorized to sell under a license to Sparrow alone. The petition therefore,  
prays that inasmuch as the Statute is so made, and fulfilled as if the license  
had been properly taken out, and no fraud was either intended or committed,  
that the said fines may be remitted. And the said Court having recommended  
a compliance with the prayer of the petition in upon consideration of his case,  
do hereby remit the aforesaid fine.

By the petition of Amos Light, and a transcript from the Records of  
Allegany County Court, it appears, that he was fined by the said Court at October  
Term 1830, the sum of fifty dollars, for selling liquor without license, and  
also the further sum of fifty dollars, for selling Day goods, without license.

The petition asks that he, in the year 1829, obtained a license  
which expired on the 23<sup>d</sup> day of January 1830, but that he was not aware of  
that fact and made himself uneasy about his license, as he stated upon the  
Bench of Allegany County Court, and was led to believe from conversation with  
him that the said license would extend till the first of May 1830, at which time  
he obtained a license for one year, the next to that he was without a license  
only from the 23<sup>d</sup> of January to the 3<sup>d</sup> of May 1830. The petition asks that  
he had no intention to violate the law and he represents that he is a  
cripple and a poor man with a wife and eight children to support, and  
that to pay the said fines will be ruinous to him. He, therefore, prays for  
remission of said fines. And the said Court having recommended a  
compliance with his prayer, upon consideration his case do hereby  
remit the said fines, as if they had been paid to the State.
