

By the petition of Theodore Wilburn Robert M. Brown and Stephen  
Wilburn, and a transcript from the records of Prince Georges County Court,  
it appears that they had entered into a recognizance, therein Theodore Wilburn  
in the sum of fifty dollars, and the said Robert M. Brown and Stephen  
Wilburn in the sum of twenty five dollars each, for the appearance of the said  
Theodore Wilburn before the said County Court at October term 1829, to answer  
for a breach of the peace as before said, and that the said recognizance  
was afterwards forfeited.

The petitioners Theodore Wilburn, state that he - knowing the  
necessity of attending in the Court room, the said recognizance was entered  
forfeited, when he was daily in attendance at said Court. He further states,  
that a presentment was made against him by the Grand Jurors at whose  
instance he was recognized, and that he was ordered to answer said  
presentment, by which the object of the recognizance was accomplished,  
that, in obedience to said arrest he attended to defend himself against  
said presentment, which he was advised that he would have been  
able to do, but that in consequence of the non-attendance of the witness  
in the State, the presentment was dismissed, he therefore prays for  
remission of the said forfeiture. And the Judges of the said Court having  
recommended a compliance with his prayer, we do hereby remit the  
aforesaid forfeiture.

By the petition of Edward Pyle of Charles County, and a  
transcript from the records of the County Court of said County, it appears  
that the said Edward Pyle, had entered into a recognizance, jointly  
and severally, with and William Lyon, in the sum of fifty dollars, for  
the appearance of the said William Lyon before the aforesaid County  
Court at August Term 1829, to answer a presentment of \$8, and that  
the said recognizance was afterwards forfeited.

The petitioners state that the said William Lyon is an  
ignorant man, and unacquainted with the forms of the Court, that  
whenever the said Lyon was taken during the term at which the  
recognizance was forfeited, but that, from his ignorance he missed  
the forfeiture, he therefore prays for a remission thereof. And the  
Justices of the Peace, and the Judges of the said Court, having recom-  
mended a compliance with the prayer of the petitioners, we do  
hereby remit the aforesaid forfeiture.
