

By the petition of Charles Ford, and a transcript from the records of Boston County Court, it appears that he was fined by the said Court at the first Term 1831, the sum of fifty dollars, for selling and putting up pounds of tea without license.

The Petitioner states that he has long been licensed to keep a store in said County, and that he supposed he was authorized under such license to sell groceries. He acknowledges that groceries were sold by him without being there specially licensed, because of his ignorance that he was thereby violating any Law. He therefore prays for a remission of a fourth of the said fine, as accruing to the State. And the Judge of the said Court, having reviewed & complied with his prayer, and do hereby remit so much of the aforesaid fine as is payable to the State.

On the nomination of His Excellency the Governor and by and with the advice and consent of the Council, William East Kansas Esquire was appointed Brigade Major and Inspector of the Ninth Brigade of the Militia of this State, vice Singleton Duval resigned.

Ordered that the Adjutant General be authorized to receive from the Post Office of the United States Government all the Army and Navy orders under the act of the Congress of the United States, providing for arming the whole body of the Militia; and that all the accounts, papers and correspondence in the Executive Department relative to said Army be deposited by the Clerk of the Council to the said Adjutant General.

A Communication was this day received from William League State Wharfinger enclosing a contract entered into with James Harwood agent of the Steam Boat Patent, for the use of a part of the Wharf fronting the South end of the State House Washington being between Dugan and E. Connelly Wharves, in virtue of an act of 1828 Chapter 88: which contract was approved.

Ordered that the act entitled "A Supplement to the act entitled an act to prevent unnecessary accumulation of laws or acts of the Legislature at Law in the County Court of this State, passed at December Session 1829: Chapter 116." the act entitled "An act to abolish imprisonment for debt on certain Judgments rendered by Justices of the Peace;" and the act entitled "An act for quieting possession, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of Purchasers;" which said acts were passed at the last Session of the General Assembly, be published, once a week for three successive weeks, in the Long Land Republican, or American; the Commercial Chronicle and Patriot, of Baltimore; the Political
