

By the petition of Charles Fox, and a transcript from the Books of Boston County Court, it appears that he was first, the said Contractor, for the sum of \$3,000.  
and fifty dollars, for selling one quarter of pound of Tea without license.

The State of Massachusetts, that he has long been licensed to keep a Tavern in said County, and that he supposed he was authorized under such license to sell groceries. I acknowledge that groceries were sold by him without being specially licensed, because of his ignorance that he was thereby violating any Law; — he therefore pays for remission of so much of the fine, as amounts to the sum of \$100. And the Judge of the said County having remitted & compliance with his prayer and do hereby remit so much of the aforesaid fine as is payable to the State.

In the nomination of His Excellency the Governor and by and with the advice and consent of the Council, William Cook Chapman Esq; was appointed Brigadier General and Inspector of the ninth Brigade of the Militia of this State, the Brigadier General resigned.

Ordered that the Adjutant General be authorized to receive from the War Office of the United States Government all the money due the State under the acts of the Congress of the United States, providing for arming the whole body of the Militia, and that all the accounts, papers and correspondence in the Executive Department relative thereto may be delivered by the Clerk of the Council to the said Adjutant General.

A communication was this day received from William Cleland Esq; of Charlestown authorizing a contract entered into with James Harwood agent of the Steam Boat Company, on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April, 1829, at the Wharf fronting the South end of the State Barn Marshalling between Dugan and Connolly Wharves; in virtue of an act of 1828 chapter 88: which contract was approved.

Ordered that the act entitled "A supplement to the act entitled an act to prevent unnecessary accumulation of debts on all debts due at law in the County Court of this State, passed at December 5<sup>th</sup> 1829 Chapter 116." the act entitled "An act to abolish imprisonment for debt on certain judgments rendered by Justices of the Peace;" and the act entitled "An act for quieting property, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of Purchasers;" which said acts were passed at the last session of the General Assembly, be published once a week for three successive weeks, in the Long Island Republican, or Tribune; the Commercial Chronicle and Patriot, of Baltimore; the Political
