

of such of the acts of the respective States, as are not now in the Library, and that he also inform the Governor of each State, respectively, that any of the Laws of the State which may not have been received by them, will be forwarded, upon applications.

By the petition of John I. Hearod and a transcript from the Records of Anne Arundel County Court, it appears that the said John I. Hearod had entered into a recognizance, in the sum of one hundred dollars, for his appearance before the said County Court, to testify for the State of Maryland against James Raymond, and that the said recognizance has been forfeited. The petitioner states that he arrived in the City of Annapolis, on the last Tuesday Morning in the month of October 1830, and that he did attend Court daily until after twelve o'clock on the following Saturday, when, by permission of the Attorney General, he did proceed home, with the unequivocal intention of returning in the Steam Boat, on the following Tuesday, agreeably to an engagement with the Attorney General, and that he did on the said Tuesday Morning proceed to the Steam Boat wharf to go to Annapolis, when to his great surprise, mortification and disappointment (being deceived by the appearance of the morning) he found, before arriving at the wharf, that the Steam Boat was moving off, and although he made signal, she proceeded without him and finding all attempts to get on board fruitless, he returned home. That he would gladly have proceeded immediately to Annapolis, could he have obtained a ready conveyance, that in view of procuring one he wanted personally on Mr. Honeywell (who was also under recognizance to attend said Court, and whom he found had not gone) to accompany him, forthwith, but found it impracticable for him to go until the afternoon, when they, after considerable trouble and expense procured a Horse and Gig, and proceeded with the night until they took lodgings within perhaps, 9 or 10 miles of Annapolis, where they arrived the next morning about 8 o'clock, and to their surprise found the Court had adjourned to April Term, and that their recognizance was forfeited, wherefore prays for a remission of the said forfeiture. And the said Court having recommended a compliance with the prayer of the petitioner, we do, hereby, remit the said forfeiture.

By the petition of Stephen Honeywell, and two transcripts from the Records of Anne Arundel County Court, it appears that he had entered into two several recognizances in the sum of one hundred dollars each, for his appearance before the said County Court to testify for the State of Maryland against James Raymond, and that the said recognizances have been forfeited. The petitioner states that he was summoned from Baltimore to attend Anne Arundel County Court, at Annapolis, in the month of January 1830, and that after remaining at Annapolis for several days in obedience to said summons, he had the permission of the Attorney General for returning to Baltimore for a few days, at a moment when his own life was in imminent danger, being for a long time confined with scarlet fever; that ready and
