

They say *P R O C L A M A T I O N*, and do by and
with the advice and consent of the Council offer a reward of one hundred
dollars, to any person or persons who shall discover the perpetrator or perpetrators
of any of the foregoing ^{described} offenses: to be paid upon conviction therefor —
Given under my hand and the great seal of the State
of Maryland, this twenty third day of July in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and thirty one and of the
Independence of the United States the fifty sixth.

Ordered that the foregoing be published once a week for four
weeks, in the Maryland Republican, Potomac, the Chronicle and
Patrol of Baltimore, and the Herald of Frederick.

By virtue of Resolution No 32 passed at the last December
Session the board examined into the claim of Gapaway Pindell
Executor of Nicholas Pindell died on account of the services of the
said Nicholas Pindell in the Revolutionary War, and determined
that there is due for the said service one hundred and ninety nine
dollars fifty five cents, — whereupon it was

Ordered that the Treasurers of the Western Shore pay
Gapaway Pindell Executor of Nicholas Pindell died one hundred
and ninety nine dollars fifty five cents, being the amount due the
said Nicholas Pindell, at the time of his death, for services rendered the
United States in the Revolutionary War, ascertained by virtue of
Resolution No 32 of the last General Assembly.

By the Petition of several Citizens of Montgomery County
and transcripts from the Records of the County Court of said County, it
appears that William Flood, William Woodward and Philip Flood,
entered into recognizance, the first in the sum of \$50, and the two
others in the sum of thirty dollars, each, for the appearance of the said
William Flood, before the Judges of Montgomery County Court at
November Term 1829, to answer for Stealing; and that the said
recognizance was afterwards forfeited. The Petitioners state
that the said William Flood has left the State of Maryland, and
been absent since soon after the aforesaid recognizance was entered into;
that Philip Flood, the father of William, is an honest inoffensive
man, disposed to do injury to no one; that he has raised a large family
and his circumstances are such as to render him unable to pay the sum,
for which he is bound without putting him to the greatest inconvenience
and distress. And the said Court having recommended a remission of the
said forfeiture, we do hereby remit the same. George Howard,
